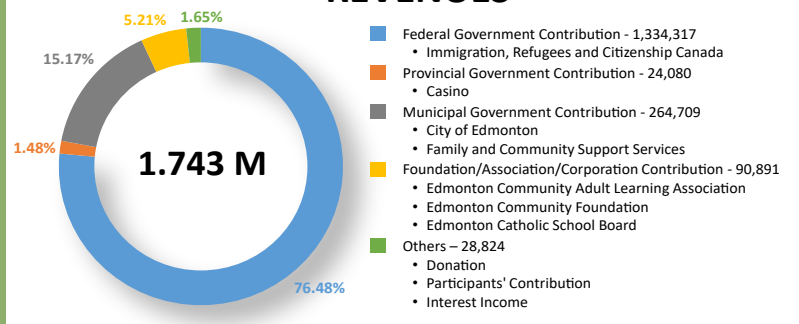

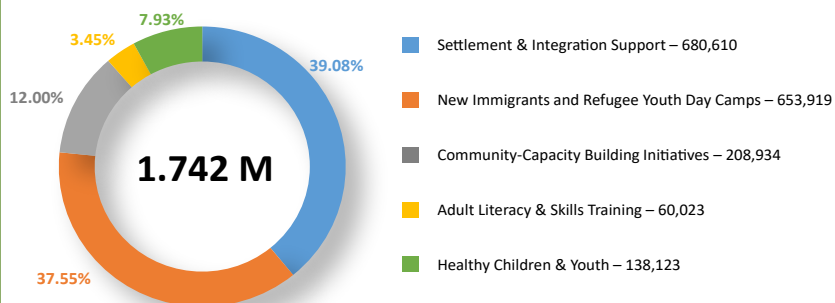

## Executive Director

This past year marked the beginning and the end of the leadership transition at Action for Healthy Communities. I am very proud to have been appointed Executive Director by our dedicated team of volunteer Board of Directors in May 2016, to lead this great organization supported by a very talented and community-minded staff team.

Our Board of Directors have been instrumental during the transition period in creating innovative strategies for us to successfully complete this process. This started with developing strategies to focus on maintaining our existing support to the clients by working on our unique community development model and finding more resources to strengthen the existing support as well as expand our reach to those who need help in the process of their individual and group's capacity building to successfully integrate into society.

The highlights of our last year include consistently achieving higher than target numbers for all programs and services including: Settlement and Integration through Community Based Bridges, Youth Camps, Community Capacities, and Literacy and Skills Development - our core programs and services. We renewed our community outreach and visibility efforts by focusing on innovative marketing and promotional strategies and increased our individual/groups clients' base significantly. In response to the Syrian crisis, and in order to meet the demands of a larger influx of refugees accessing services at our facility and respond to the offers of volunteer support from the community at large, we created programs and services that have been highly successful.

We also created new initiatives and foundations for some programs that will be further expanded or implemented in FY17-18 and years after that. These include signing of a new three year contribution agreement with IRCC to implement a settlement and integration program (2017-2020), entrepreneurship program for newcomers, employment support for newcomers, and after school programs for needy children in collaboration with West-6 Network, Edmonton Public School Board.

Guided by our mandate and unique community development model, we hope to learn more about our community as a whole and find ways to collaborate with other communities, government organizations, and the public towards creating a vibrant and inclusive Edmonton for everyone.

My special thanks to our hard working and passionate staff team, our dedicated volunteers including our Board of Directors, community partners, funders and private donors for supporting us during the last year. Together, we truly are stronger as we advocate for and work towards supporting the successes of, our participants/clients in greater Edmonton.

Last spring was bittersweet as we said good-bye to Ivon Pereira, our longtime Executive Director, and welcomed our new Executive Director, Aftab Khan. Ivon served 13 years at AHC and was the driving force behind our approach to community building. In other words, she left big shoes to fill! Aftab has been a great addition to the AHC team. From the beginning, he has hit the ground running. His first key order of business was to help us find a new facility. He did a fantastic job landing the space we now call home and having it renovated to meet our growing needs. Over the past year, he has also strengthened our marketing and communications platform; identified opportunities for us to be a more competitive employer, and located funds to put towards purchasing a facility in the future.

Over the course of the year we saw high demand for our programs. As was the year prior, the greatest need has been for supporting Syrian refugees to settle and integrate into Edmonton. Thanks to Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC), the City of Edmonton, and private donors, we had the resources to build a specialized team to accommodate their needs. Every month we are helping hundreds of refugees locate resources such as primary services, housing, and income support. We are currently seeking additional resources from IRCC to meet the growing demand for this program.

The Board of Directors continues to work toward our 10-year Strategic Plan (2015-2025). The common theme in our strategic plan is building a sustainable organization. We believe increasing our unrestricted funding base, delivering quality programming with good governance, growing at a manageable pace, and building brand awareness will maximize our ability to thrive in the future. We are a few years in and I am very happy with the progress we have made to date. A few actions we accomplished in the past year were hiring a full-time Communications Coordinator, developing a marketing plan and creating a plan to purchase our own facility.

Of course none of this would be possible without our amazing team at AHC. At the Open House in April I was pleasantly reminded how dedicated and passionate our staff is. It was a pleasure meeting new team members and talking to staff about their work. Everyone spoke with such enthusiasm and it truly touched my heart. The Board very much appreciates the work the staff does and are fortunate to have such a great group!

To the Board Members who served in 2016/17, thank you for committing your time and skills to us. While this will be my last year as the Chair, I'm excited to pass the torch to new leadership and support you as the Past Chair. ## Settlement and Integration Supports: Community-Based Bridges Program

AHC Settlement and Integration supports program focuses on assisting newcomers to Canada through our unique Community Development model, which centres on working with multiple stakeholders to create opportunities for wraparound services as well as promoting capacity building.

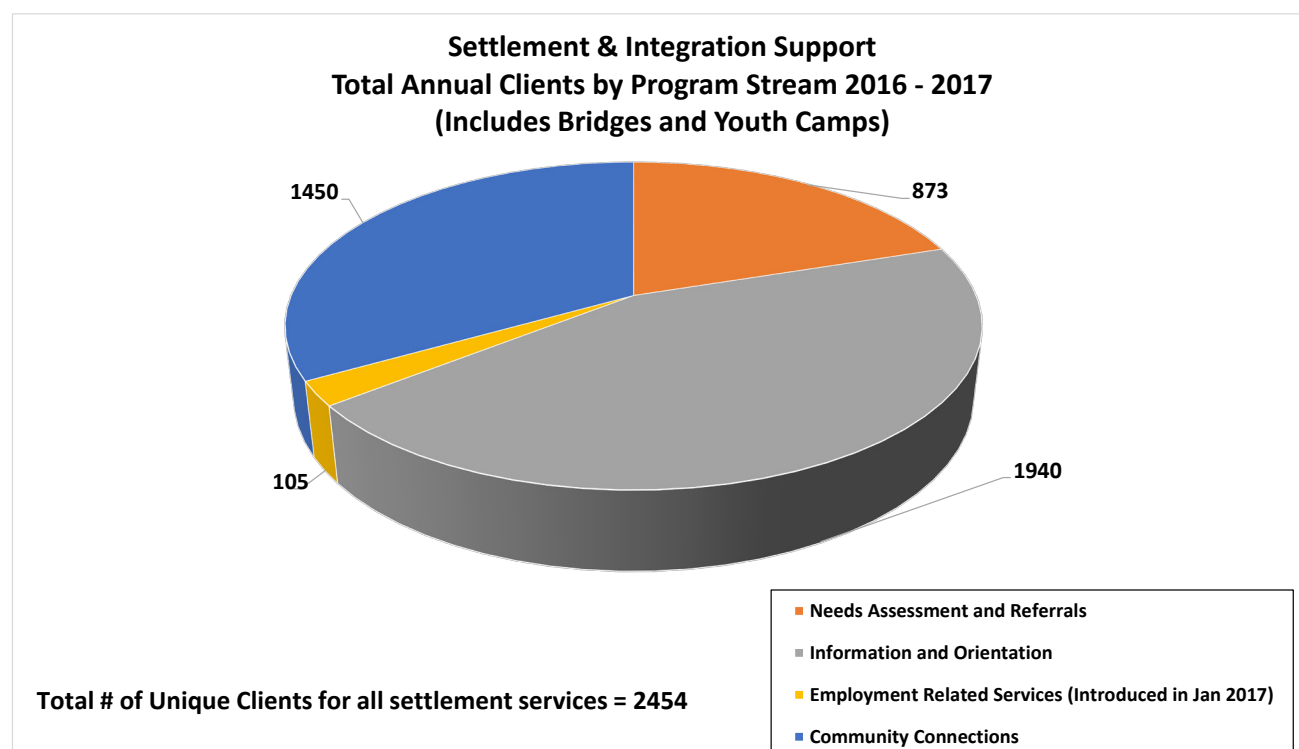
Newcomers receive personalised supports to address their needs and goals, as well as assistance to utilize their strengths and resources and to develop the skills and abilities they need, to meet those goals.

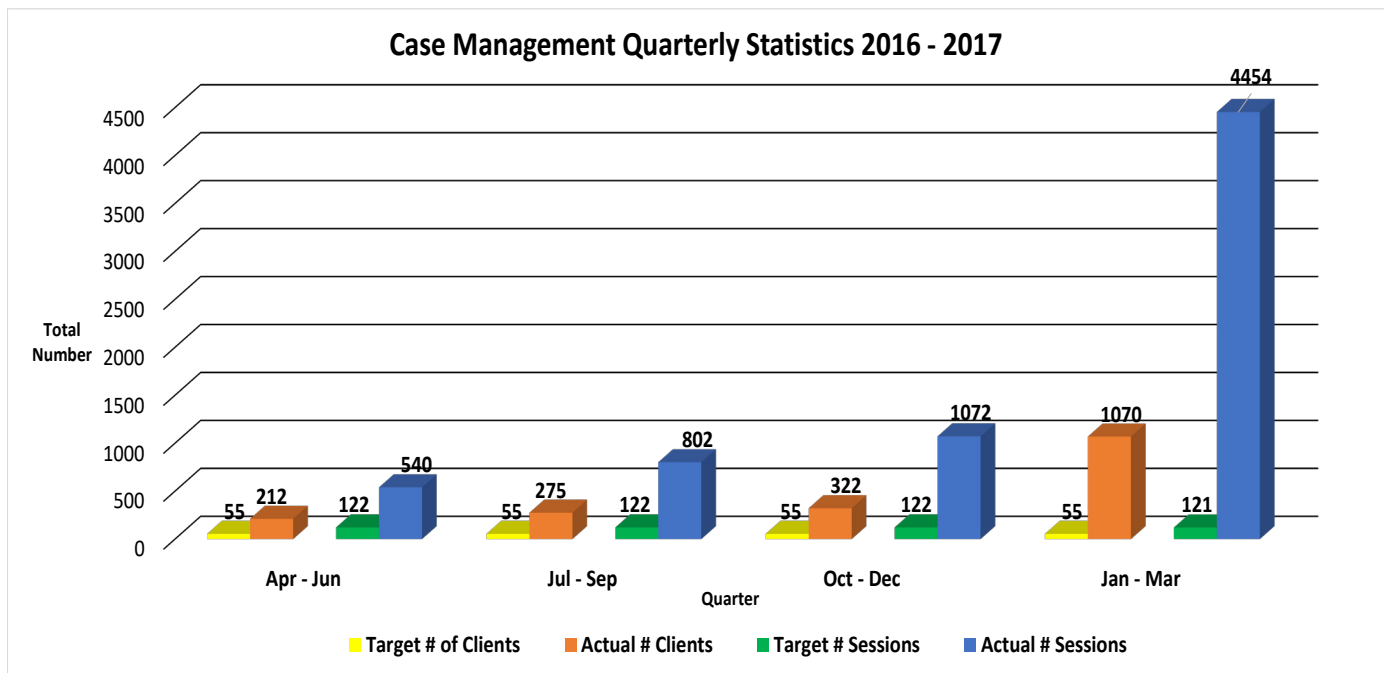
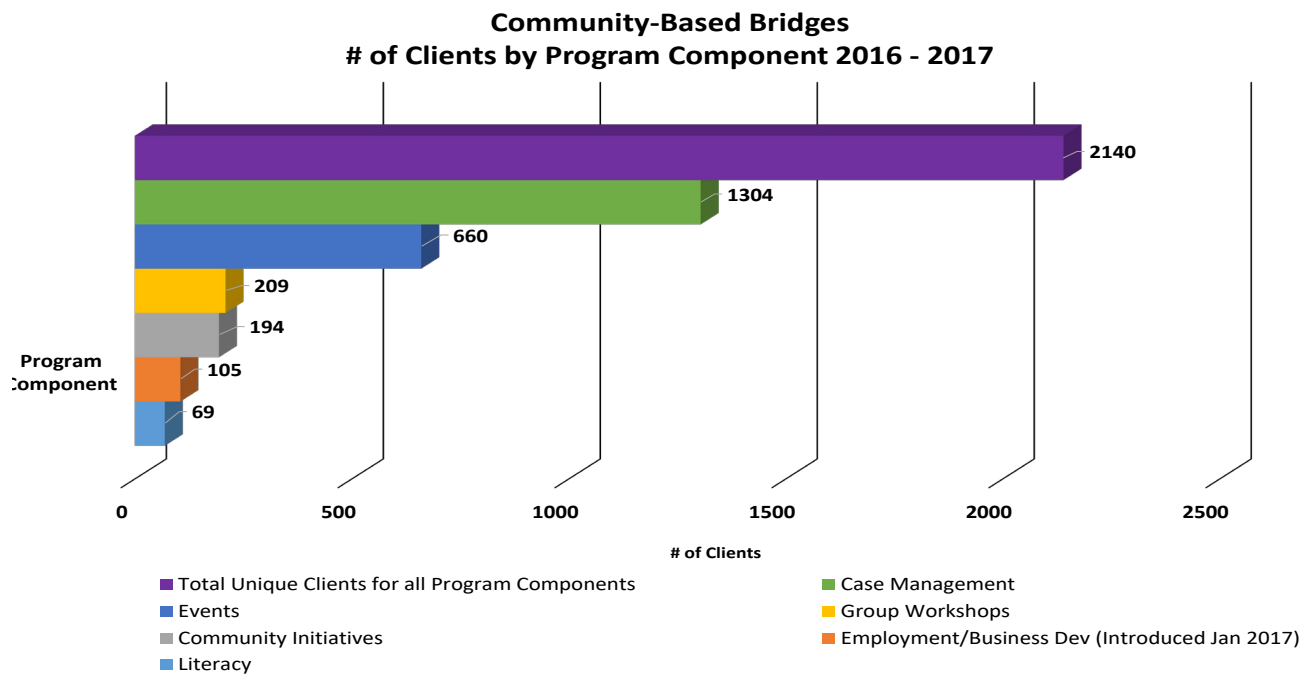
The program includes the following major components:

- One-on-one and family settlement supports through case management, as well as a strong focus on facilitated community referrals to address short-term and long-term needs/goals.
- Group sessions/workshops addressing common topics of interest and areas of need
- Special events such as resource fairs, cultural celebrations, and community field trips
- Literacy classes
- Employment supports
- Community initiatives focused on settlement and integration

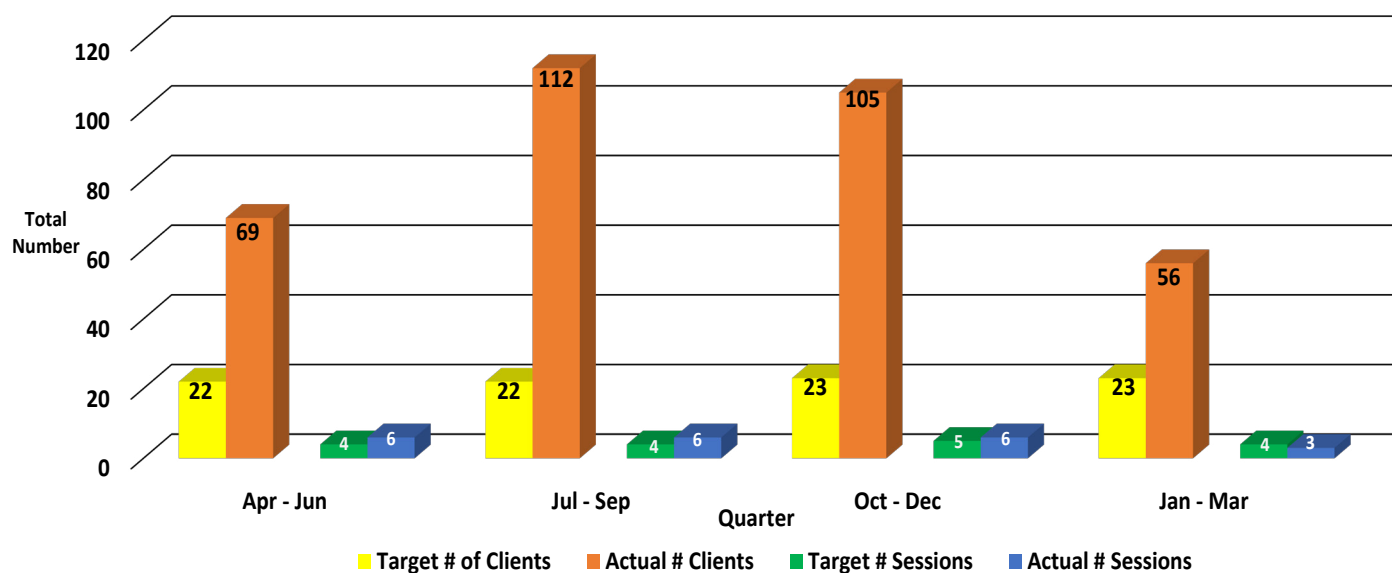
In April 2016, we began a program component directed specifically to support Syrian newcomers, and in one short year, we have had at least one interaction with 97% of the Syrians who came to Edmonton as government assisted refugees, as well as supported other Syrians who are not government assisted refugees. In January 2017, we also started an employment program for Syrians, and have worked with 105 participants as of April of 2017.

The following charts detail our participants in the various program components listed above for the 2016-2017 fiscal year.

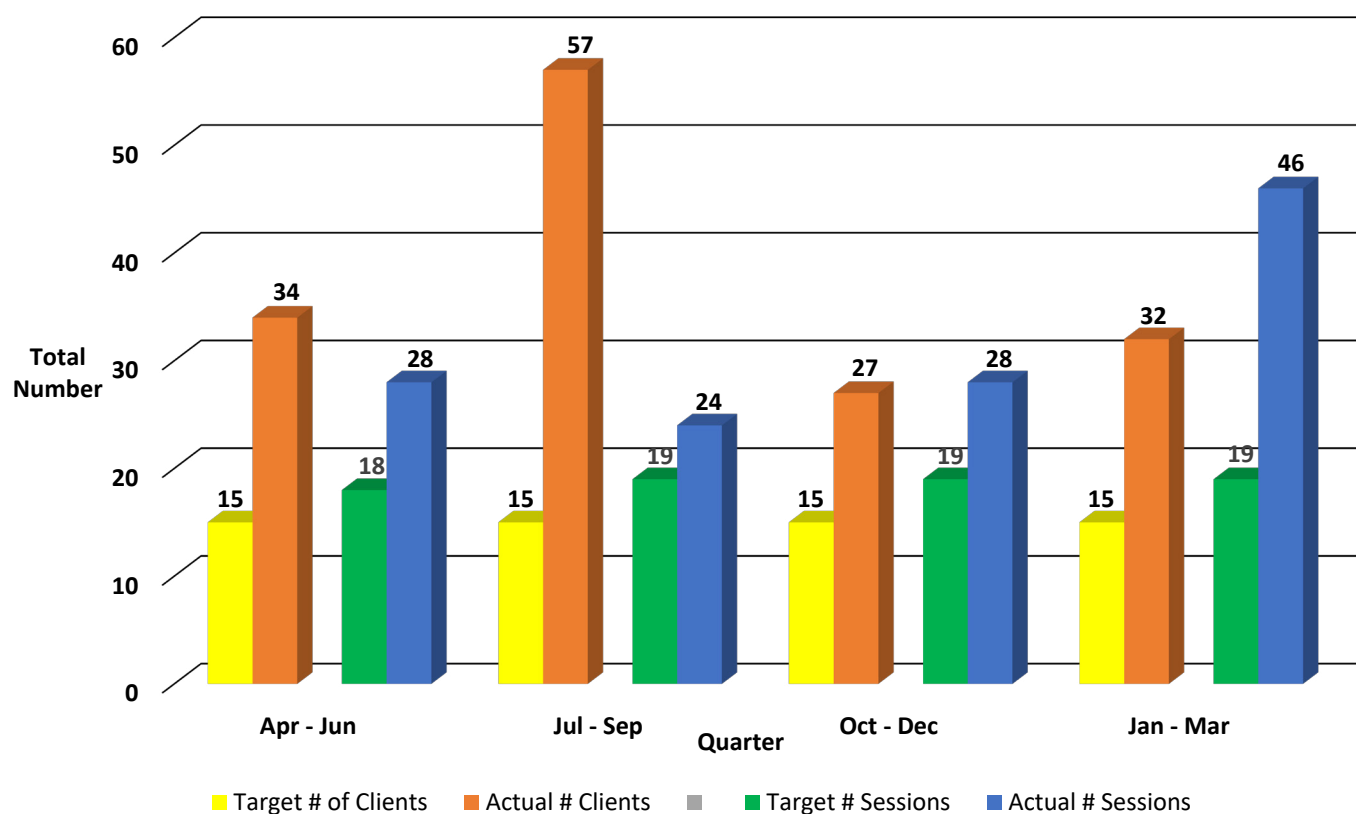




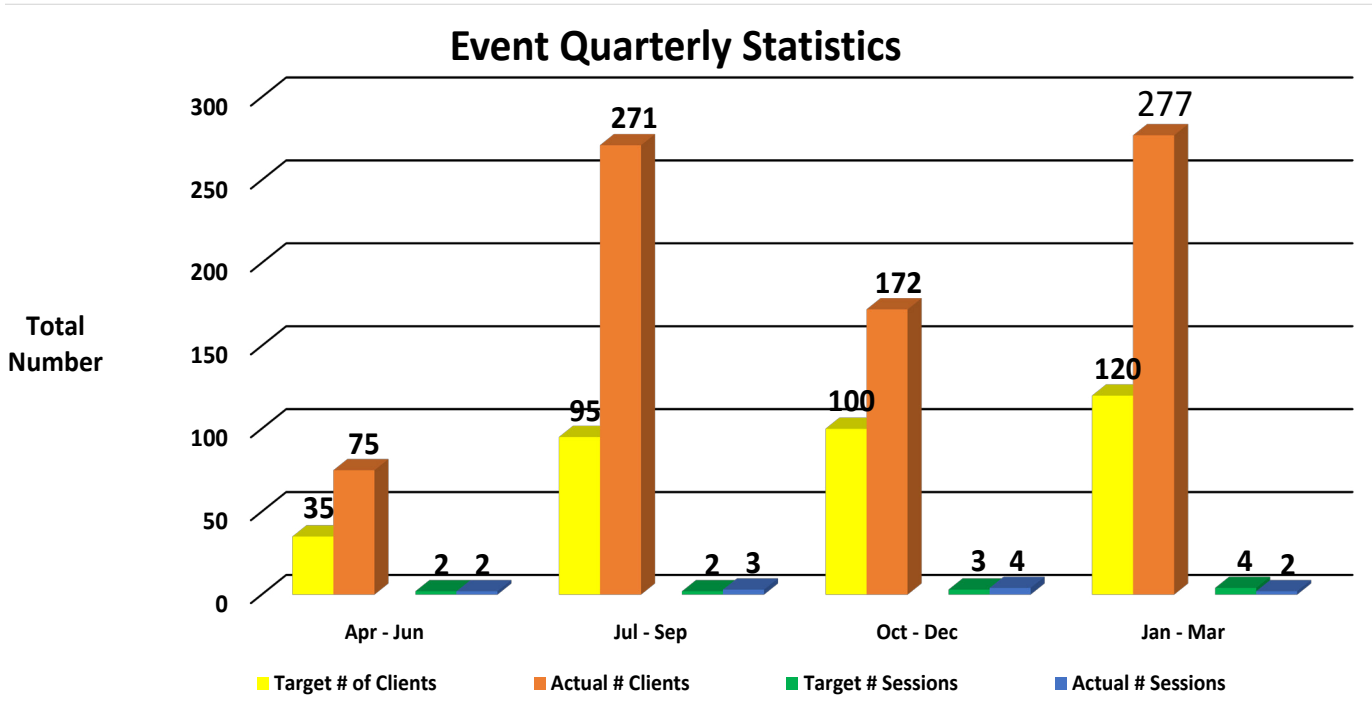
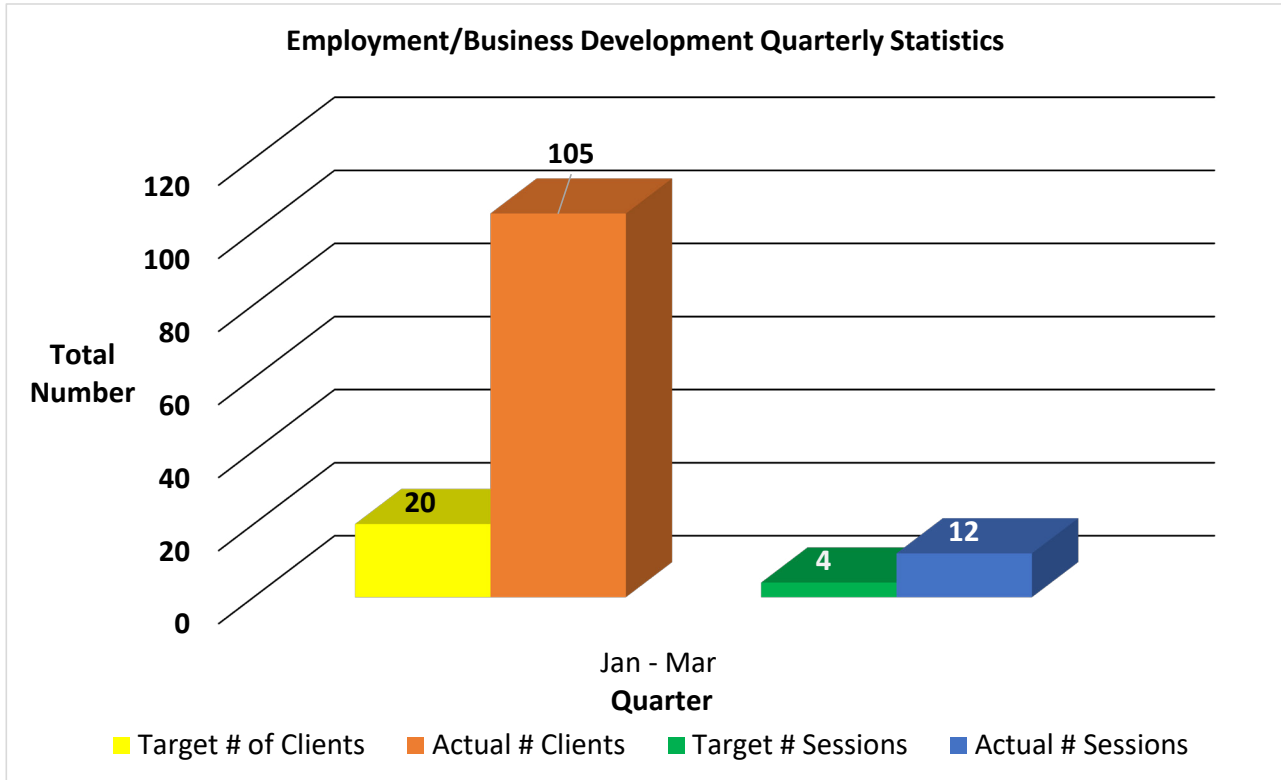
Group Workshop Quarterly Statistics 2016 - 2017



Literacy Classes Quarterly Statistics





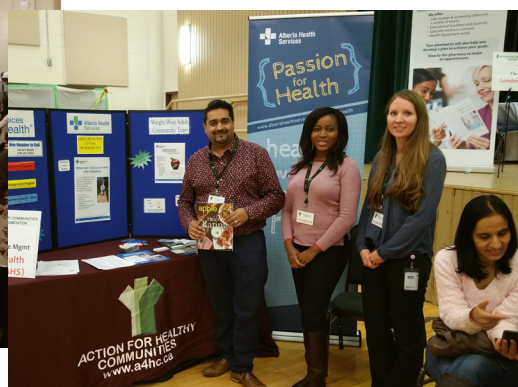

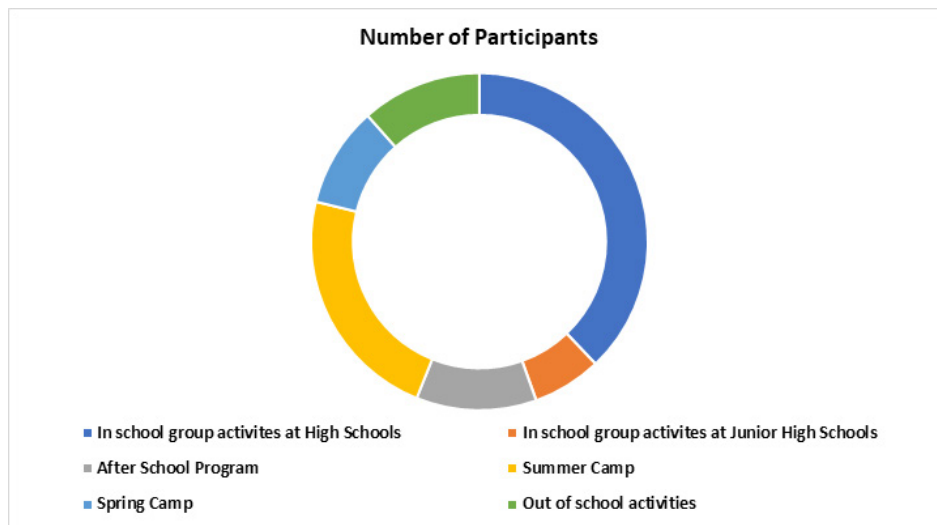


## Healthy Children & Youth Program

### New Immigrant and Refugee Youth Camps

AHC's Youth Camp program continued to work delivering supports and diverse activities for new immigrant children and youth to address the unique and multiple challenges they face in their settlement process. Group activities with students are designed to provide information about Canada, to facilitate community connections, to develop their personal skills and to enhance their English language skills. These activities were offered at 24 partner schools during last year's in-school hours and after-school hours. More than 700 children and youth benefit from youth camp activities. In addition, 6 groups of Youth Clubs had 150 youth participants. 295 children and youth participated in Summer Camps and 125 children and youth attended Spring Camps.

New components of the Youth Camp program added in 2016-2017 were the out-of-school activities such as: Youth Clubs, Ready to Work, Learning Table and Leader in Youth. These new initiatives gave more diverse opportunities for youth to participate in various recreational activities and skills development training.

### Healthy Active Community Kids (HACK) Program

In 2016, AHC initiated a new program, Healthy Active Community Kids (HACK) provides a safe and enriching environment for grades K-6 to improve physical, social, and emotional health, culinary arts and crafts, music, leadership skills, and school engagement to vulnerable elementary school children in west Edmonton schools. HACK programs are located at: Athlone School, Belmead School, and Sherwood School, in collaboration with FCSS, Edmonton Community Foundation (ECF) and Realtors Community Foundation (RCF).

The program is designed to offer quality child development, and fun-filled activities during after-school time. It also provides a safe and enriching environment to improve physical, mental, emotional, and social wellness activities to vulnerable elementary school students. The program also includes outreach and support to parents/guardians in addressing needs at home that affect their children's development, thus program staff and parents/guardians work in collaboration to deal with, or prevent, issues related to bullying, self-esteem, and nutrition. In this way, the program involves a system-based approach to the students' well-being.

#### Participants:

Healthy Active Community Kids has offered quality programming to a total of 90 elementary-school participants since September 2016 at Athlone School, Sherwood School, and Belmead School.

#### Workshops:

Once a month guest facilitator(s) perform sessions. Sample guest facilitators include: Edmonton Public Library, First Nation workshops on design and identity, Crankpot workshops, Yoga instructors, and Zumba instructors.

#### Camps

Three fun filled winter camps were offered during school holidays for a total 66 participants. Children cooked, learned new skills from variety of guest facilitators about healthy living, social-emotional development, and community development.

#### Sessions for parents

Sessions such as positive parenting are offered to parents once per term. A series of sessions on the requested topics from parents are offered once per term.

#### Celebration of learning

All schools had a Celebration of Learning in December 2016. The next will be in June 2017 in order to celebrate the achievement of our participants throughout the term with parents, staff, volunteers, and school management.

## Community-Capacity Building Initiatives Program

In 2016, through its Community-Capacity Building Initiatives Program, AHC provided support to 42 Community Initiative groups. Meeting diverse needs of communities, we provided effective services to new immigrants, refugees, and communities. Our support included, but was not limited to: making community connections, promoting cultural diversity and social inclusion, developing life skills and leadership skills, enhancing healthy living and community well-being, improving youth education, and facilitating enrichment of the lives of women, elders and new immigrants. We helped communities access to our seed grants and other resources. In the past year, we held 4 workshops and 2 activities for leadership training with participation of around 260 people. Our 5 fantastic Multicultural Gatherings attracted around 1,500 people to attend our events. Our Adult Literacy and Skills Training provided 4 learning opportunities to our clients: Computer, English as Another Language, Basic Math and Numeracy and Entrepreneurship training. Over 300 participants attended the classes.
