In this report, you will read how our programs and services including Settlement and Integration, Employment, Entrepreneurship, Newcomer Youth Empowerment and Inclusion, Empowering Black Girls, Healthy Active Community Kids, Adult Literacy and Skills Development, Volunteer Development and other Community Development supports continue to successfully build the capacity of individuals and communities to help them integrate into society.

This year was incredibly challenging and rewarding for the AHC. Challenging because we all saw an unprecedented situation due to the COVID-19 pandemic and rewarding for AHC due to its responsiveness to the communities' needs. We also received significant financial support from FCSS, City of Edmonton, Government of Alberta, Edmonton Community Foundation and other private donors and foundations to strengthen our program and services and start new initiatives including employment, entrepreneurship, financial empowerment, community mobilization and development. As you can see from our financials, all these resources will help us to provide more enhanced programs and services to Albertans and improve our financial viability.

All pages of this report are full of excitement and success stories which would not be possible without the support of amazing staff, volunteers, board members, supporters and community partners.

I want to personally thank all our funders, supporters, partners and each and every one of you for your time, commitment, dedication and support for the past year.

Edmonton Healthcare Citizenship Project registers as a society in Alberta, holding meetings in private residences.



The Edmonton Healthcare Citizenship Society (EHCS) obtains charitable status.



A Project Team was constituted, responsible for receiving applications and allocating money for seed grants. The Coordinator served as the link with the board. Six members were originally recruited.



EHCS's logo is created, symbolizing a tree with three shades of green representing growth. The three branches of this tree represent our mission, objective, and vision. The leaves of the tree, though not pictured, represent the various communities flourishing and growing. The trunk of our tree, from which we gain our ability to stand tall and offer support, is represented in our guiding values.



EHCS's 10th Anniversary - Ivon Idalia becomes Executive Director and remains in the position until 2016, overseeing much of the agency's significant growth and expansion.



Official name change to Action for Healthy Communities (AHC).

The Newcomer Youth Empowerment and Inclusion Program (formally New Immigrant and Refugee youth) starts with funding from CIC.

AHC's formal training program of Community Development Animators & Promoters (CD A&P) was launched through the Voices from our Neighborhoods Initiative. 2007-2013 saw the training of 50+ CD-A&P.



AHC moves to its own leased office space on 105 ave and 110 street.

The **Leadership Training** and **Multicultural Gatherings** projects are created. Both activities become part of the [current] Community Capacities program funded by FCSS.

The **Adult Literacy & Skills** classes are funded by ECALA.

The **Community Action Dash** event begins.

First Annual Community Development Conference - organized by AHC in partnership with FCSS, the Muttart Conservatory, and CIC (now IRCC).

The first **Connecting Us All conference** takes place—organized by AHC, The Edmonton Mennonite Centre for Newcomers, the Edmonton Multicultural Coalition, Edmonton Chamber of Voluntary Organizations, The Edmonton Federation of Community Leagues, The City of Edmonton and Alberta Culture & Tourism.

AHC transitions in May to its third and current **Executive Director, Aftab Khan**.

Due to growth and expansion, AHC **moves to its current office location** (still in Queen Mary Park) on 113 street and 105 avenue in October.

The **Healthy Active Community Kids (HACK) program** begins with funding from FCSS and ECF.

AHC launches its redeveloped **Entrepreneurship Supports Program** funded by ECF, City of Edmonton, and ECALA.

In March AHC signs its **five-year (2020-2025) contribution agreement** with IRCC to run settlement, employment, entrepreneurship, and youth programs in the Greater Edmonton area and **Settlement in Schools and Community Programs** in three small towns (Camrose, Cold Lake and, Bonnyville - operations outside Edmonton launch in April).

In June 2020, AHC celebrates its **25 Year Anniversary** as a registered society.

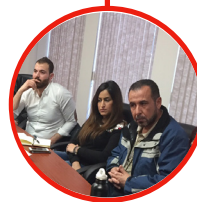

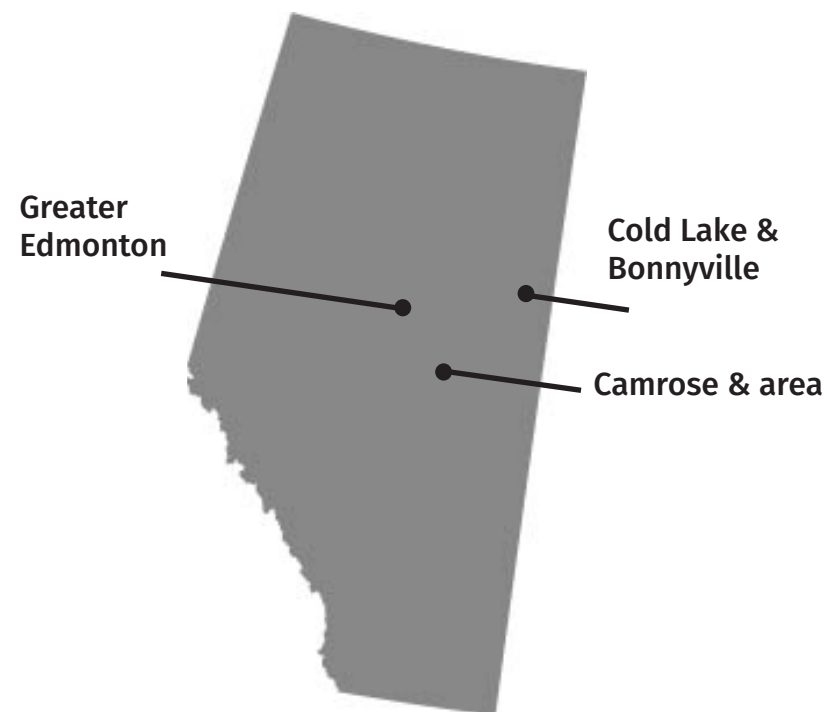

The 2019/2020 fiscal year was marked by the expansion of employment programming at Action for Healthy Communities and the addition of several valuable new partnerships. Two of the highlights include a recruitment event we supported to hire concessions staff for Roger's Place and a hands-on Workforce Exposure event at IDEAL Contract Services Ltd. that introduced Newcomers to careers in drywall and painting. In the upcoming year, AHC's employment team will continue to build on these relationships to offer engaging and meaningful employment activities and programs for our job-seeking clients in addition to customized one on one employment supports.

Newcomer Youth Empowerment & Inclusion

AHC's Youth program facilitates community connections and skills development of Canadian youth to increase the protective factors in their positive development process. The Newcomer Youth Empowerment and Inclusion program continues to empower and educate new immigrant youth. The Empowering Black Girls project provides leadership training and gives black girls opportunities to celebrate their heritage and to address the unique barriers that they face. AHC's Youth program has strengthened its workplace readiness support. In 2019/2020, with RBC Foundation support, youth received workplace technology training. Our partnership with the Commonwealth Games of Canada in 2019/2020 for Sport4Newcomer initiative, enhanced cross-sector partnerships to create an inclusive and welcoming environment for new immigrants. Furthermore, the AHC youth program expanded its geographical scope to other parts of Alberta starting from Camrose and Cold Lake.

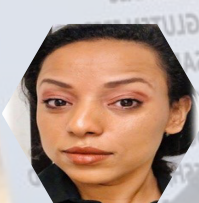

Entrepreneurship Supports

In 2019/2020, AHC's Entrepreneurship program evolved its delivery process significantly. The program is well known in the city for delivering customized supports for entrepreneurs including among a myriad, strategic mentorship involving two levels of business development training, business coaching and networking. The mentorship focuses on experiential engagement to reinforce the entrepreneurs' capacities to successfully plan and launch or scale their businesses. The mentorship also assists business owners in expanding their skills, networks/ social capital, and access to resources.

The program has established diverse partners ranging from industry organizations, business coaches, consultants, mentors, financial institutions, government bodies, entrepreneurship supporting agencies and educational institutions. The program's ongoing plans include more hands-on engagements such as business club activities, B2B exchanges/trips, investors clubs and much more.

AHC's Entrepreneurship program had to swiftly transition to online delivery to maintain regular engagement supports during the COVID-19 pandemic. The program supported businesses affected by the pandemic gain access to government resources to mitigate the impact due to the lockdown.

In 2019/2020 the HACK program was able to offer STEM activities with the support of TELUS Friendly Future Foundation. Children had dedicated time each day to learn a variety of skills relating to science, technology, engineering and math through sensory stimulation, measurements, coding, engineering robots, synths, droids, rovers, electronic music, pulleys, catapults, sensors, circuits, hydraulics, bridge development and free play inventions using gadgets. In addition, we also offered a parent group twice a month to better support parents with meeting others, building skills and talking about mental health.

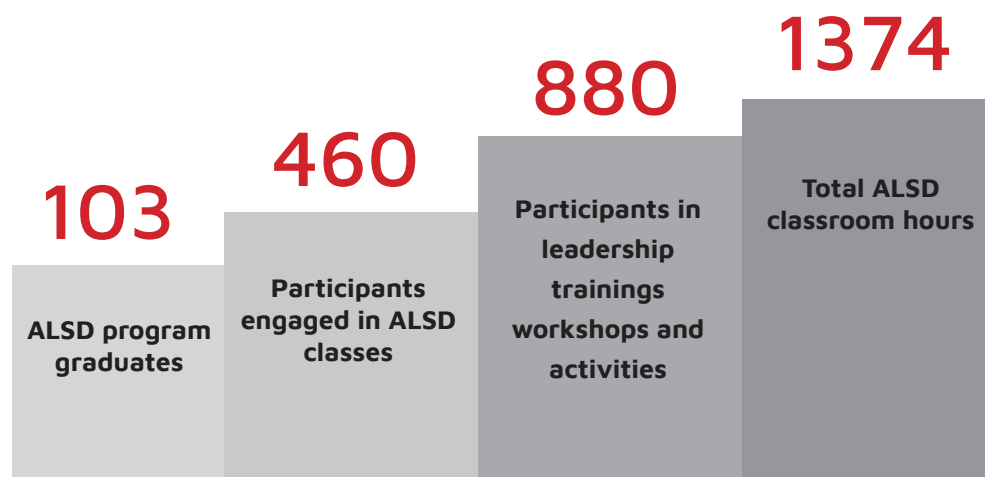

Adult Literacy & Skills Development

In 2019/2020, we helped new immigrants and newcomers develop and improve their English literacy and other essential skills for daily life, including computer literacy, basic digital skills, financial literacy, and community leadership. In the last year, our program expanded from 5 classes to 10 classes, while the number of sites has increased from 3 locations to 5. To meet our community leaders' challenges in today's rapidly-changing society, we initiated a series of innovative community leadership training workshops in 2019, including: "Nurturing Women Leaders for Tomorrow's Rapidly Changing Society", "PTSD and Vicarious Trauma – Strategies for Support, Coping and Leadership", "Mental Health Matters in the Future" and "The Impacts of Artificial Intelligence on our Life".

"My name is Helen Cruz. I am from of El Salvador and I have been in Canada for 2 years. I love this beautiful country. I also understood that when you don't have enough knowledge of English, it can be a big barrier in your daily life. I have been a student in the English Language Learning program at Action for Healthy Communities since 2019. I felt that I have improved my English a lot. One of the things that I love about Action is that you can join and share with different cultures while learning the language at the same time. All the staff members are very friendly and professional. I thank Action for Healthy Communities and all their professional staff for their support even at the moment when we are living with a COVID-19 pandemic. 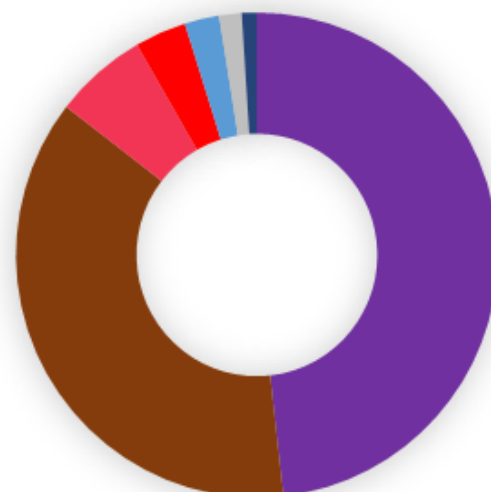
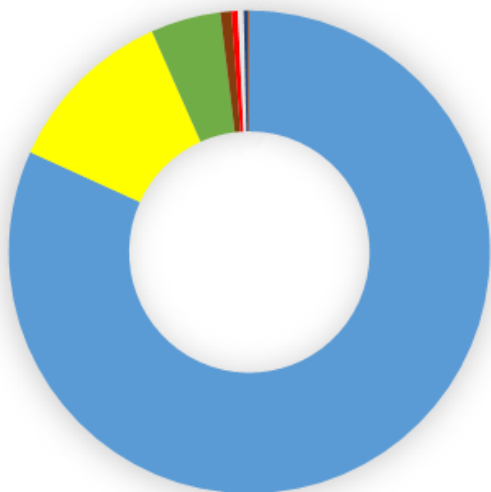
